Chicken Skewers with Tzatziki

INGREDIENTS

- 4 chicken breasts
- 1 lemon
- 2 tsp oregano
- 1 garlic clove
- 1 small yellow and 1 small red pepper
- Tortilla wraps, baby spinach and parsley to serve
- ½ cucumber, ¼ garlic clove, 4tbsp Greek yoghurt, 1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil for the Tzatziki

EQUIPMENT: 8 Bamboo Skewers

METHOD

- 1. Cut the chicken into small pieces
- 2. Zest and squeeze the juice from the lemon, and add to the chicken, with the oregano and garlic. Season with salt and pepper. Pop in the fridge for 15 minutes.
- 3. Deseed and chop the peppers
- 4. Heat a griddle pan. Add the chicken and the chopped peppers to the skewers, alternating as you go along. Griddle for 10 minutes, turning occasionally.
- 5. While the skewers are cooking, make the Tzatziki. Cut the cucumber in half (lengthways) and discard the water seedy core. Grate the cucumber into a bowl. Grate and add ¼ of a garlic clove. Season generously and stir in the Greek yoghurt.
- 6. Serve the skewers hot off the griddle pan, with the dip. You can even take the children and peppers off the skewers and pack into whole meal wraps, spread with Tzatziki, with spinach and parsley.
